## Staying safe in the desert

Carry and drink plenty of water; at least one gallon per person per day.

Sun protection is important. Remember to wear lots of sunscreen and protective clothing.

Ouch! Desert vegetation is spiky, so avoid contact. Spines may be removed with tweezers.

Flash floods occur instantly and are dangerous. Avoid washes when rain is threatening.

Never enter a flooded roadway. Wait for the water to subside and it is safe to cross.

Do not stick your hands or feet anywhere you cannot see. That is where snakes, scorpions, and spiders all hide.

Hike with a partner. Let someone else know where you are going and when you plan to return.
